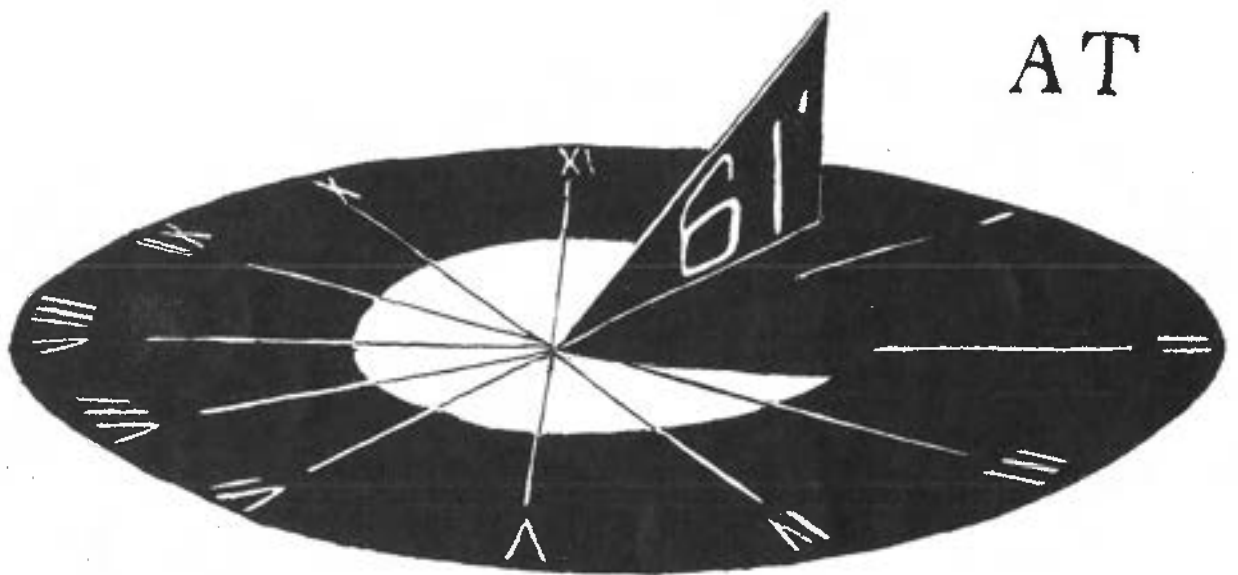

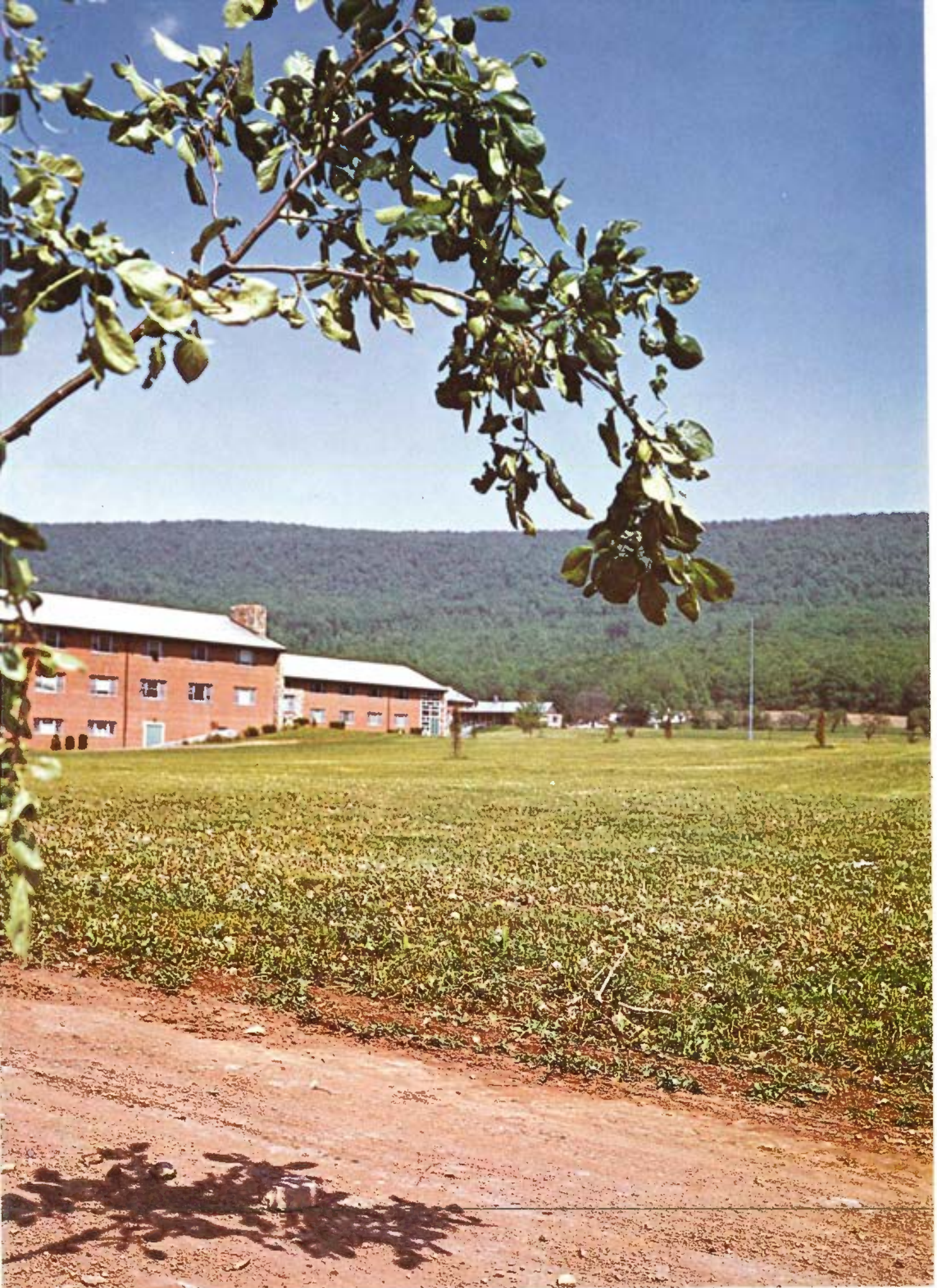

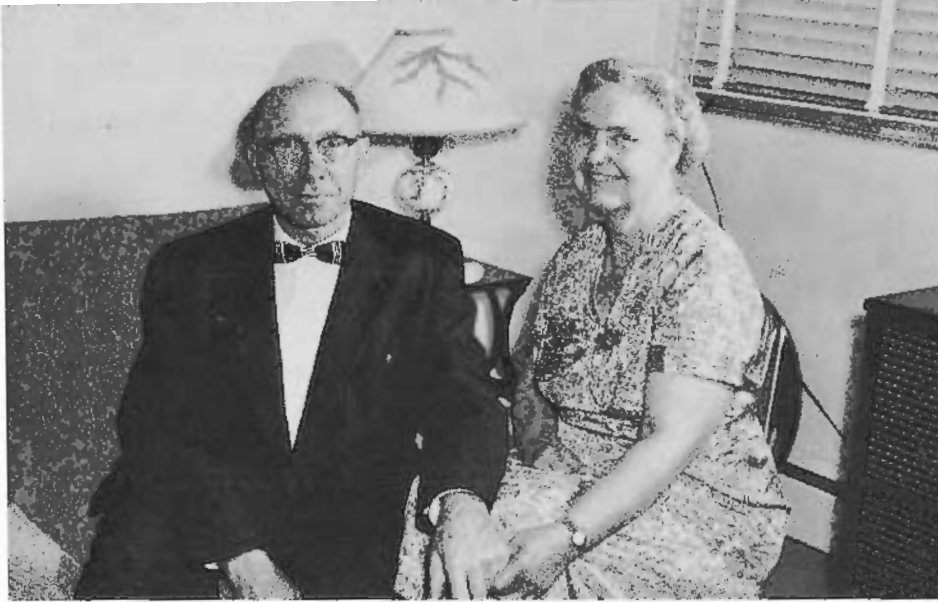
THE HALVORSENS

THE EDISONS

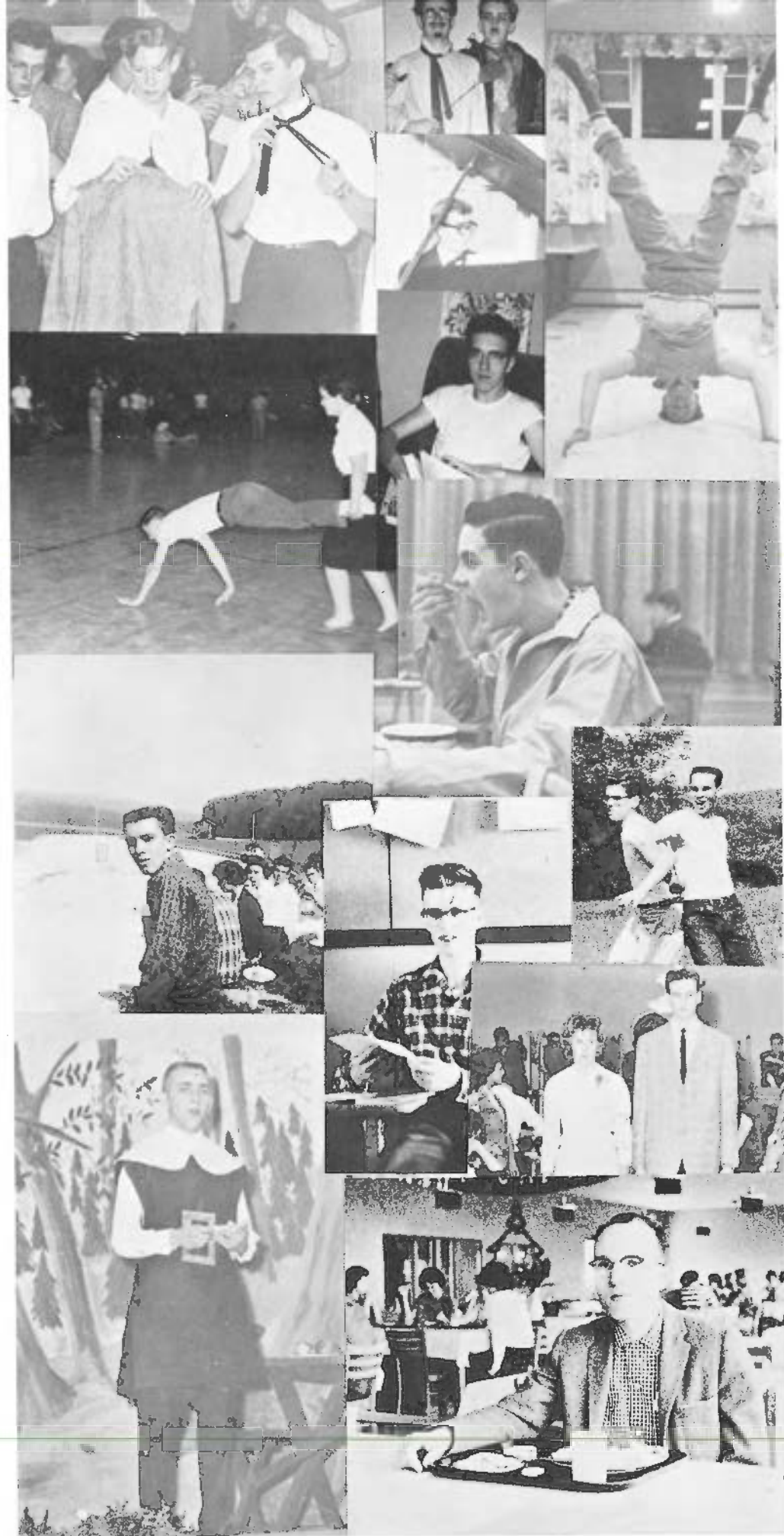

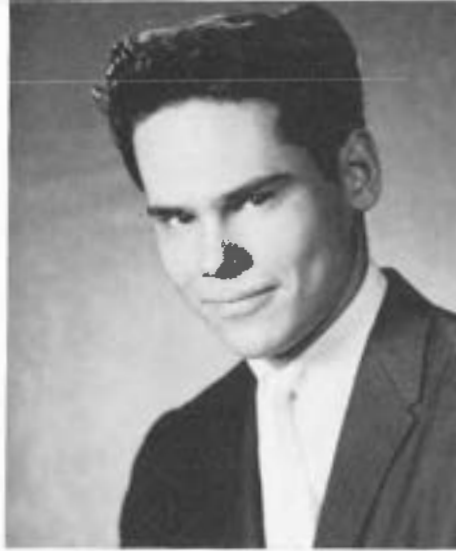


BARBARA MEI-LING EWING-CHOW

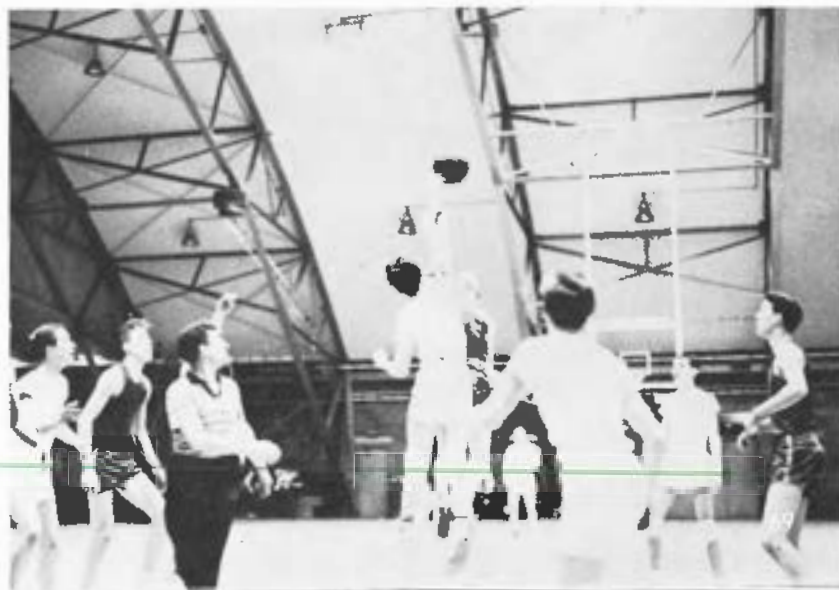
